## From the Rabbi

Life is precarious and unpredictable. When things go well, we take its blessings for granted.

True, we take care to eat well and healthily, we exercise, we try to get enough rest and generally live a healthy life style. We dedicate ourselves to our job and profession, keeping up with the latest development in our chosen field, and work hard to keep our standard of living at the level that we desire.

Yet, things happen which upset the carefully designed balance that we have created. Suddenly, frequently without warning, things change. It seems that we have lost all opportunities to affect our lives. Around us swirl the winds of disaster that make us think that we have lost control. We may be right.

During the High Holiday Mussaf service we say: "On Rosh Hashanah their destiny is inscribed, and on Yom Kippur it is sealed, ... who shall live and who shall die; ... who shall be at peace and who shall be molested; ... who shall become poor and who shall become rich." God determines on these days our individual future, so we pray that His decision be one that we desire. It seems like this choice is out of our hands and influence.

Or, is it? We close the prayer with the famous line, "But repentance, prayer and charity cancel the stern decree." This teaching and understanding applies not only to the High Holiday period, that we can influence the decision that God will make. It even functions the rest of the year, when God gives us the unbelievable power to force Him to change what He has decreed.

Not to have a harmful decision made in the first place is the optimal situation, but we also have the power to reverse these decisions after they have already been made, any time in the year, if we approach God sincerely and ask Him for His help.

What is true in the life of the individual is also true in the collective lives of people, of society, and of nations. On Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, we say in the Amida, "sentence is pronounced upon counties for war or peace, for famine or abundance." Who imagined that this would be the year that almost 4,000 rockets would rain down on the cities and towns of Israel, that 3 of our precious young High School boys would be kidnapped and killed, and that the Israeli response would be war against the terrorists in Gaza. Yet, God so decreed last Rosh Hashanah.

I believe that perhaps his decree was even harsher. More civilian deaths and injuries and a greater number of military casualties should have been expected according to the natural order and progress of a war of such intensity. But our prayers, our unity, our charity and acts of *chesed* proved to be too great to allow the terrible tragedy to reach its planned level. We were, thankfully, able to influence God to annul the harshness of the evil decree.

This is the power that God has given us. If we take our ability to control our destiny seriously, we will again pledge to do the things that will arouse God's compassion over us individually and nationally, and we will be blessed with a year of life, health, prosperity and peace.
