# FROM THE RABBI

In 1948, Winston Churchill said to the British House of Commons **"Those that fail to learn from history are doomed to repeat it."** He wasn't the first to say, as the Spanish writer and philosopher is credit with saying "Those who cannot remember the past are doomed to repeat it," in the late 1800's. In reality the Torah says virtually the same at the end of Devarim where Moshe exhorts the Israelites "remember the days of the past, understand the years of all generation". I believe that these thoughts are a prime consideration of how we make decisions for appropriate action.

We know that the evil Adolf Hitler wrote and said that his goal was to exterminate the Jewish people. Many other people thought that this need not be taken seriously. And yet, he attempted to fulfill this goal and succeeded in killing 6 million of our people. When someone makes such verbal and written threats, believe that he will try.

Many centuries before that time, we began to celebrate the holiday of Purim which marks the defeat of the wicked Haman who crafted the infamous royal edict which announced that all the Jews in the Persian (Iranian) empire, me, women and children will be annihilated. Esther, after pleading with the king, sent a second royal edict allowing the Jews to defend themselves and destroy their enemies. The result was the hanging of Haman, and the killing of 800 of his fighters and supporters over 2 days just in the capitol city, Shushan. Additionally, 75,000 of his fighters and supporters throughout the empire were killed.

So many people, including women and children were killed in just one of fighting, the rest of the population were so devastated that they rejected Haman's edict and stopped fighting. Imagine what would have happened if they had not surrendered and continued fighting! Only the total defeat of those threatening the Jewish people will bring peace to us and to our neighbors.

Today, the threats of Hamas are clearly visible and they continue despite the continued suffering of innocent civilians. The Hamas charter states: *The hour of judgment shall not come until the Muslims fight the Jews and kill them, so that the Jews hide behind trees and stones, and each tree and stone will say: 'Oh Muslim, oh servant of Allah, there is a Jew behind me, come and kill him,' except for the Gharqad tree, for it is the tree of the Jews.* (Hamas Charter, Article 7). The warning is clear!

The responsibility and desire of all the civilian deaths belong to Hamas. Hamas senior leader Ismail Haniyeh, <u>commenting</u> on the loss of civilian life in Gaza on October 26, 2023: **"The blood of the women, children and elderly [...] we are the ones who** 

need this blood, so it awakens within us the revolutionary spirit."

Those who fail to learn from the past are doomed to repeat it. I believe in this. What I learn from the past is that the fight to destroy anti-Semitism will be achieved when there is total victory of those who seek to annihilate us. We must continue this battle until we are victorious.

May the hostages be released immediately, may the war end in victory and perhaps we will add another holiday to the Jewish calendar in recognition of God's role in this victory.

## Matanot La'evyonim – Purim Charity

One of the *mitzvot* of Purim is to deliver gifts to the poor on Purim day. Rabbi Silber will again distribute gifts to local needy through the Jewish Family Service, and to Israeli poor through the Od Yosef Chai charitable organization.

Believe it or not, there are Jewish needy in our city and when they have received help at holiday time, they have expressed great thanks and satisfaction. Purim, being a holiday dedicated to "*simcha*" - joy, requires us to assure that all Jews can rejoice. The poor rejoice when they have the means to sustain their lives, leading to the importance placed on this mitzvah.

In order to participate in this mitzvah, donations may be sent to the shul or given to the rabbi by Monday, March 18. Donors are asked to mark their checks as "Purim charity" and specify whether they wish the money to be distributed locally or in Israel. Contributions received after March 18 will be sent to Israel. The deadline for contributions to be distributed in Israel is Purim morning, March 24 at 9:00 am.

Please do not hesitate to text or email Rabbi Silber with a pledge for this purpose if you cannot get to the check to the shul office before these deadlines, and he will advance the funds on your behalf.

## Beth David Sisterhood Remembers Marlene Serkin

Beth David Sisterhood suffered a great loss with the passing of our dear friend and member Marlene Serkin a few weeks ago.

When I first met Marlene, she was President of Sisterhood. She later served as our Treasurer, and finally as Co- president. She ran the rummage sales which were our primary source of income, and solicited merchants to donate items for the paid up- membership meeting raffle.

For Yom Kippur she supplied and set up yahrzeit candles and tea lights for Kol Nidre, and organized and set up the Yom Kippur break- fast. She also prepared the menu and did all the shopping for the kiddushes during Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret, and Simchat Torah.

For the weekly Shabbos kiddushes she supplied basic food items, paper goods, and kitchen incidentals and additionally collected the empty soda bottles to be returned for the deposit.

For many years she sent out notices and flyers (which in recent years were designed by her son Rabbi David Serkin). She was an invaluable source of information about anything Sisterhood.

I have not mentioned any of the things she did for Sisterhood before I came to Binghamton, since I have no direct knowledge of them, and I have probably forgotten several of the things she did for Sisterhood since then. She never expected special recognition for all her efforts.

Although it is not a Sisterhood project, I feel compelled to also mention the many years she was the editor of this Chailine.

We at Sisterhood will miss Marlene very much.

## Purim Customs and Practices

When: Purim begins on Saturday, March 23 at night, after Shabbat, and lasts through the day of Sunday, March 24. The fast of Esther is observed on Thursday, March 21.

**Work** is permitted on Purim. However, we usually spend most of the day in fulfillment of the various *mitzvot* of Purim, as will be enumerated below.

**The Four** *Parshiot*: There are special Torah readings as the *maftir* during four *shabbatot* from the Shabbat before Rosh Chodesh Adar until the Shabbat before Rosh Chodesh Nisan. The *Shabbat* before Purim we read *Parshat Zachor* – remember – and this serves of an affirmation to remember the evil that occurred to the Jewish people in the past and a commitment to never forget, and never again allow genocidal murder to take place. According to most authorities, hearing this portion of the Torah read is one of the 613 *mitzvot*. You are encouraged to be in shul on Shabbat morning, March 23 to fulfill this obligation.

**Ta'anit Ester** – the fast of Esther: We fast on the day before Purim in commemoration of the fasting that the Jews observed on the day of the battle. The name of the fast is associated with Queen Esther, as she had declared three days of a national fast before approaching the king to request the annulment of Haman's decree. Since the day before Purim is Shabbat, the fast is observed on the Thursday before Purim, March 21. This fast is observed from morning to night, beginning at 5:41 am and ending at 8:00 pm. If you have special circumstances that may make it difficult to fast, please consult with the rabbi.

**Reading the** *Megillah*: It is a mitzvah to hear the *Megillah*, the scroll of Esther, read both at night and during the day of Purim. At Beth David we will be reading the Megillah on Saturday night, March 23 at 8:40 pm and Sunday morning, March 24 at 8:50 am, following Shacharit. If you cannot make the morning reading, it will be read again at the shul at 3:00 pm, prior to the festive meal.


It is customary to contribute to synagogue maintenance before hearing the *Megillah*, in commemoration of the *machatzit hashekel*, the three half shekels that were given each year in Adar for the maintenance of the holy Temple in Jerusalem. Since Purim starts right after Shabbat, we make this contribution either on the Fast of Esther before Mincha, or before we read the *Megillah* on Purim day.

*Matanot La'evyonim* – Gifts to the poor: It is a mitzvah to give at least two gifts to each of two poor people on this day as Purim charity. Rabbi Silber will be collecting and distributing Purim charity to local Jewish poor through the Jewish Family Service and to the poor in Israel through the *Od Yosef Chai* organization. Contributions for this purpose should be made to the Rabbi's Discretionary Fund and please note how you wish your contribution to be divided, between local or Israel needs. Contributions for local needs must be made by **Monday, March 18**, while gifts for Israeli poor may be made until the morning Megillah reading. *If you cannot get your checks to the office by these dates, please contact Rabbi Silber by email or text message with your pledge and he will advance the money for you.* 

*Mishloach Manot* – food gifts to friends: Commonly known as *shalach manos*, we give at least 2 portions of ready-to-eat foods to at least one other person. The mitzvah of sharing Purim joy through food is commendable, but more of our holiday funds should be allocated for gifts to the poor.

*Seudat Purim* – the Purim feast: It is a mitzvah to participate in a festive meal on Purim day (not at night). Beth David will conduct its annual Purim Seudah on Sunday, March 24 at 4:00 pm. *See announcement in this issue!* 

**Special prayers:** On *ta'anit Esther* we add special prayers and Torah reading at both the morning and afternoon services, as is customary for fast days. On Purim we add *al hanissim* in Grace after meals and the *amida*. If one forgets, it need not be repeated. There is a special Torah reading in the morning, before the *megillah* reading. The day after Purim is known as *Shushan Purim* and is the day that Purim is celebrated in Jerusalem. We do not say *tachanun* in honor of day.
