

Chanukah, 2016-5777

From the Rabbi

Chanukah celebrates the purification and the rededication of the Holy Temple after it was defiled by the Greeks. The rabbis also see within the word “Chanukah”, as spelled in Hebrew, a clue as to the date of this great miracle.

The first part of the word, “chanu” means “they camped” or, in reference to the battles that had been raging for some time that the Jewish people were victorious, were able to rest and relax, since the war was over. The end of the word, “kah” is composed of the two Hebrew letters, chaf and hey. We know that the Hebrew letters each has a numerical equivalent, and the numerical equivalent of these two letters is 25. The number 25 represents the 25th day of the Hebrew month of Kislev, the day that the war ended and the day that was designated to begin this 8 day holiday.

Chanu-kah, the war ended on the 25th day of the month of Kislev.

The events that led up to the Maccabean revolt made life difficult and threatening for the Jews. The Holy Temple was captured by the Syrian-Greeks, they filled it with idols and defiled all the holy vessels, they held the temple and its service hostage and did not allow the Jews to pray and serve in the Temple. Many laws and decrees were promulgated that prevented normal, regular Jewish practices. The study of Torah was forbidden, the practice of any Jewish law, and even the most inconsequential custom was made illegal at the threat of death. It was impossible to live as a Jew.

One thing that the Syrian-Greeks could not outlaw was the private and personal meditation. The recitation of certain words, no matter how silently, was what kept many Jews loyal to their faith and confident of the eventual victory that Judaism would have over the pagan practices of their adversaries.

For centuries and millennium, whenever a Jew found himself threatened, whether by the Greeks or the pogroms, by the crusades or the Nazis, there was one simple and yet profound verse in the Torah composed of 25 letters, that gave the Jew comfort and spiritual satisfaction. That verse is “*Shema Yisrael*”.

These 25 letters reaffirm our belief in the one God who we know will always protect His people. He will give victory to the weak from the hands of the mighty and will allow us to
